Dr. Sasha Kasman Laude is Assistant Professor of Piano at Utah State University. A 2025 American Piano Awards finalist and prizewinner of the Honens International Competition, this season she performs with Dover Quartet and Indianapolis and Brevard symphonies. Frequently heard on NPR's Performance Today, Kasman Laude appeared with orchestras across the US and Ukraine and gave recitals at Steinway Hall, Yamaha Ginza Hall, Salle Cortot, and twelve cities across Italy. A graduate of UAB, Juilliard, and University of Michigan, Kasman Laude has given masterclasses at MIT and University of Calgary, and served on the jury of the 2024 L.A. International Liszt Competition. She has taught/performed at Southeastern, Vivace, IKIF, IKOF, and Fry Street festivals, returning this summer to USU Piano Festival and pianoSonoma.



Michael Clark is a pianist, teacher, and scholar noted for his "natural, clear, and nuanced" performances (*Piano Magazine*). An advocate for the music of Florence Price, he made the first studio recording of her <u>complete piano waltzes for Navona Records</u>, edited the first publication of <u>twenty of her intermediate pieces for</u> <u>Hal Leonard</u>, and has performed her works around the country. 

Dr. Rebecca Rivera completed her Doctorate of Musical Arts degree in bassoon performance at the University of Southern California, studying with Rose Corrigan and Judith Farmer.



Mezzo-soprano **Cherry Duke** has performed over 60 principal roles with opera companies and orchestras throughout the US and abroad.
